ONE LINER QUESTION FOR QUICK REVISION

- 1) The banker recalled to his mind the party in a <u>dark autumn night</u> while <u>pacing from corner to</u> <u>corner of his study room.</u>
- 2) About the party (i) hosted by <u>Banker</u>, (ii) <u>15 years</u> before in the <u>autumn</u>, (iii) present many <u>clever</u> <u>people</u>, (iv) mostly <u>scholars</u> and <u>journalists</u>, (iv) talked about <u>much interesting conversation</u>. (v) also talked about <u>Capital Punishment</u>.
- 3) The guest found Capital Punishment (i) <u>obsolete</u> as a mean of punishment, (ii) unfitted <u>to a</u> Christian State and <u>immoral</u>.
- 4) One of the guests observed that the State has no right to take away life as **State is not God.**

 - (x) to drink wine, (xi) smoke tobacco.
 - (xii) he can <u>communicate</u>, in silence, through <u>a little window</u>, (xiii) Everything necessary he could receive in any quantity by <u>sending a note through the window</u>.
 - (xiv) had to stay from twelve o'clock of November 14th, 1870 to twelve of clock of November 14th, 1885. (xv) if he escaped only two minutes before the time free the banker from the obligation to pay him the two millions.
- 24) During the 1st year of imprisonment (i) suffered terribly from <u>loneliness and boredom</u>, (ii) the <u>sound</u> of Piano was heard, (iii) <u>rejected wine and tobacco</u>, (iv) sent <u>books of a light character; novels with</u> a complicated love interest, stories of crime and fantasy, comedies, and so on.

- 26) During the 5th year of imprisonment (i) <u>music was heard</u> again, (ii) asked for <u>wine</u>, (iii) only <u>eating</u>, <u>drinking and lying</u> on his bed, (iv) <u>yawned</u> often and <u>talked angrily to himself</u>, (v) did <u>not read books</u>, (vi) at <u>nights</u> he would <u>sit down to write</u>, (vii) wrote for a long time but <u>tore it all up in the morning</u>, (viii) more than once was <u>heard to weep</u>.

- 27) During the second half of the 6th year (i) began zealously to study languages, philosophy, and history, (ii) in space of four years he read about six hundred volumes, (iii) sent a letter to the banker to show these lines in six languages to the experts, (iv) if they did not find any mistake, the banker fired a gun in the garden, (v) two shots were fired.
